SEYCHELLES PRESIDENT PATRICK HERMINIE ARRIVES IN NEW DELHI

Seychelles President Dr Patrick Herminie's five day state visit to India has marked a decisive new chapter in bilateral relations, culminating in the announcement of a 175 million dollar development assistance package and the signing of seven key agreements aimed at expanding cooperation across strategic sectors. Undertaken at the invitation of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the visit reflects the growing depth of India Seychelles ties and highlights New Delhi's sustained focus on the Indian Ocean region and the Global South. President Herminie arrived in New Delhi after concluding a series of engagements in Chennai and Mumbai, where he met political

leaders, business stakeholders, and representatives from multiple sectors including governance, industry, coastal management, and healthcare. His arrival in the national capital was marked by a warm reception from Union Minister of State for Health and Family Welfare and for Chemicals and Fertilizers Anupriya Patel, underscoring the importance India attaches to its relationship with the island nation.

The Ministry of External Affairs described the earlier engagements in southern and western India as highly productive. In Chennai, President Herminie attended the India Seychelles Business Forum organized by the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and

Industry. The forum brought together leading business figures, policymakers, and industry representatives to explore new avenues of collaboration. Addressing the gathering, Herminie outlined priority sectors for partnership including digital technologies, renewable energy, tourism, higher education, and electric mobility. He emphasized Seychelles' openness to Indian investment, particularly in sectors aligned with sustainability and economic diversification.

A dedicated CEOs roundtable allowed direct interaction between Indian industry leaders and the Seychelles delegation. Discussions focused on regulatory frameworks, long term investment opportunities,



and Seychelles' potential role as a gateway to African markets. Business leaders expressed interest in collaborating in sectors linked to innovation, climate resilience, and emerging technologies.

In Mumbai, President Herminie met Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis. Their discussions centered on port led development and coastal management, areas of natural alignment between Maharashtra's extensive coastline and Seychelles' identity as a small island nation with a maritime focus. Both sides explored cooperation in ports, logistics, marine infrastructure, and sustainable coastal development. Fadnavis welcomed the delegation and extended warm wishes to Seychelles on the occasion of its 50th year of independence and the 50th anniversary of diplomatic relations between the two countries.

The Seychelles delegation included Minister for Foreign Affairs Barry Faure, Minister for Finance Pierre Laporte, Minister for Transport Veronique Laporte, and Minister for Tourism and Culture Amanda Bernstein. The presence of senior ministers reflected the comprehensive and multi sectoral nature of the visit.

The most significant developments unfolded in New Delhi, where

President Herminie held wide ranging talks with Prime Minister Narendra Modi and met President Droupadi Murmu. The discussions covered bilateral, regional, and international issues including maritime security, economic cooperation, climate resilience,

healthcare collaboration, defence, and people to people ties.

Following the talks, India announced a Special Economic Package worth 175 million dollars to support Seychelles' development priorities. The package includes 125 million dollars as a rupee denominated Line of Credit and 50 million dollars as grant assistance. It will fund projects in social housing, electric mobility, vocational training, healthcare, defence, and maritime security. Additionally, India will provide 1000 metric tonnes of grains and lentils as part of the support measures.

Prime Minister Modi described the moment as a turning point in the partnership. He stated that the India Seychelles relationship extends far beyond formal diplomacy, rooted in centuries of shared maritime history and cultural exchanges across the Indian Ocean. Emphasizing Seychelles' role in India's MAHASAGAR vision, which stands for Mutual and Holistic





Advancement for Security and Growth Across Regions, Modi said the island nation is an integral maritime neighbour and trusted partner.

Both leaders agreed to deepen cooperation in sustainability, trade, security, and the blue economy. Hydrography emerged as a significant focus area, with India committing assistance for the establishment of a Seychelles Hydrographic Unit. This initiative is expected to strengthen Seychelles' capacity for marine mapping and support its blue economy ambitions.

Seven agreements were signed during the visit, covering digital solutions, export promotion, data sharing, and maritime scientific research among other areas. These agreements signal a shift toward structured and institutionalized collaboration in emerging sectors.

Development cooperation remains a cornerstone of the bilateral relationship. India has long supported Seychelles through infrastructure projects, defence assistance, education scholarships, and healthcare partnerships. During emergencies and natural disasters, India has acted as a first responder, reinforcing trust and goodwill. The newly announced package builds on this legacy while aligning assistance with Seychelles' own national priorities.

Healthcare collaboration featured prominently in the discussions. Given Seychelles' limited domestic healthcare infrastructure, partnerships with Indian medical institutions are crucial for access to specialized treatment and capacity building. India reaffirmed its commitment to supplying affordable, quality medicines and strengthening healthcare infrastructure in the island nation.

Climate change and renewable energy were also central themes. As an island state vulnerable to rising sea levels and extreme weather events, Seychelles faces acute climate challenges. Both countries agreed to expand cooperation in renewable energy, resilience building, and climate adaptive solutions. India will share expertise in marine research and capacity building to support sustainable development.

Defence cooperation and maritime security continue to form key pillars of the partnership. As nations located in the strategically significant Indian Ocean region, India and Seychelles share concerns related to maritime safety, illegal fishing, piracy, and disaster response. Prime Minister Modi welcomed Seychelles as a full member of the Colombo Security Conclave, a regional security grouping aimed at strengthening maritime coordination. The move is expected to enhance collaborative efforts to ensure peace and stability in the Indian Ocean.

Diplomatic observers note that the timing of the visit holds symbolic and strategic importance. This year marks five decades of diplomatic relations between the two countries. Over time, the partnership has evolved from development assistance to a broad based strategic engagement encompassing defence, economy, technology, education, and cultural exchange.

President Herminie's visit demonstrates a deliberate effort to expand ties beyond government to government diplomacy. Engagements with state leaders, business communities, and sector specific stakeholders indicate a focus on practical cooperation and economic integration. The emphasis on digital transformation, electric mobility, and sustainable infrastructure aligns with global trends while addressing Seychelles' domestic priorities.

For India, strengthening ties with Seychelles reinforces its broader outreach to the Global South and consolidates its strategic presence in the Indian Ocean. For Seychelles, deeper engagement with India offers access to finance, technology, capacity building, and a trusted security partner.

As President Herminie concluded his engagements in New Delhi, expectations remained high that the visit would translate into tangible outcomes. The scale of the development package, the breadth of agreements signed, and the clear articulation of a shared vision indicate that India Seychelles relations are entering a new and dynamic phase.

The visit not only commemorated fifty years of diplomatic partnership but also laid the foundation for the next phase of collaboration rooted in sustainability, security, and shared growth. With concrete commitments on the table and renewed political momentum, India and Seychelles appear poised to deepen their partnership in ways that respond to contemporary challenges while honoring a relationship shaped by history, geography, and mutual trust.

DELHI ON ALERT 800+ PEOPLES ARE MISSING



Delhi has been placed on alert after reports revealed that more than 800 people were reported missing within the first two weeks of January 2026, sparking widespread concern across the national capital. The figures, which spread rapidly on social media, created anxiety among residents and renewed debates over public safety, particularly for women and children. As the numbers circulated without much context, fear and speculation began to dominate public discussion. According to official records, a total of 807 missing person reports were registered between January 1 and January 15. The data showed that a large share of those reported missing were women and minors, which intensified public unease. Parents, commuters, and neighbourhood groups expressed growing worry, with many questioning whether the city was witnessing a sudden rise in crime or a breakdown in law and order.

Delhi Police later clarified that the figures did not indicate an unusual surge. Officials explained that the capital typically records a high number of missing person complaints each month due to its

massive population and constant migration. On average, around two thousand such cases are reported monthly, making the January numbers broadly consistent with past trends. Police also noted that missing person reports cover a wide range of situations, including individuals leaving home voluntarily because of family disputes, personal stress, or employment reasons. Authorities added that a significant number of cases are resolved within days, with many people traced through routine investigation. By the time the January data was reviewed, hundreds of individuals had already been located. However, the remaining untraced cases continued to fuel concern, as families waited for news about their loved ones.

The situation drew further attention when the National Human Rights Commission took suo motu cognisance of the reports and sought detailed explanations from the Delhi government and police. The Commission highlighted that large numbers of missing persons, especially women and children, raise serious questions about safety, prevention, and support

systems in the city. Its intervention underscored that even if the figures are consistent with historical data, the human impact cannot be ignored.

Public reaction to the missing persons reports was amplified by social media, where alarming messages and videos spread quickly, often without verification. While authorities warned against panic and misinformation, many citizens argued that the issue reflects a deeper, long-standing problem rather than a temporary scare. Activists pointed out that treating such figures as routine risks normalising a situation that affects thousands of families every year.

Experts say multiple factors contribute to people going missing in a large urban centre like Delhi. Rapid urbanisation, migration, domestic conflict, mental health challenges, and social pressure are frequently cited reasons. Teenagers and young adults are particularly vulnerable, often leaving home impulsively without understanding the risks involved. Beyond statistics and official statements, the missing persons issue remains deeply personal for affected families. Each report represents a life interrupted and relatives trapped in uncertainty. The recent attention has renewed calls for better communication by authorities, faster investigation processes, greater use of technology, and stronger community support systems. While officials maintain there is no extraordinary spike, the episode has served as a reminder that missing persons remain a serious and persistent concern in the capital. Ensuring safety, trust, and timely action will be crucial in addressing both public anxiety and the realities faced by families searching for answers.

TRUMP SIGNALS NEW TRADE DEAL WITH INDIA



Donald Trump has announced a new trade deal with India, calling it a major breakthrough in economic relations between the two countries and a step toward strengthening bilateral cooperation. The announcement, made during a public address, immediately drew global attention, given Trump's influence on international trade policy and India's growing importance as a strategic and economic partner for the United States.

According to Trump, the proposed trade agreement focuses on expanding market access, reducing trade barriers, and boosting investment opportunities for businesses on both sides. He described India as a "key partner" and praised its rapidly growing economy, large consumer base, and strategic role in the Indo-Pacific region. Trump said the deal aims to create jobs, enhance supply chains, and ensure what he called fair and balanced trade between the two nations.

The announcement comes at a time when global trade dynamics are shifting amid geopolitical tensions, supply chain disruptions, and efforts by major economies to reduce dependence on single markets. Trump stated that the deal would help American

companies gain better access to Indian markets, particularly in sectors such as manufacturing, energy, agriculture, and technology. At the same time, he emphasized that Indian exporters would benefit from smoother access to US consumers, potentially increasing trade volumes and long-term cooperation.

Indian officials and business leaders responded cautiously but positively to the announcement. While welcoming the intent to deepen trade ties, they stressed the importance of protecting domestic industries and ensuring that any agreement aligns with India's development priorities. Analysts noted that India has traditionally taken a measured approach to trade negotiations, balancing openness with the need to support local manufacturing and small businesses.

Trade experts believe the proposed deal could build upon previous discussions between the two countries on tariffs, digital trade, and investment norms. Past negotiations have faced hurdles over issues such as import duties, agricultural access, and data regulations. However, Trump claimed that the new agreement reflects "mutual respect and understanding" and signals a

willingness to resolve long-standing disputes through dialogue.

The announcement also carries political significance. Trump has often highlighted trade deals as evidence of strong leadership and economic nationalism. By emphasizing India as a trusted partner, he appeared to position the agreement as part of a broader strategy to strengthen alliances with democratic nations while reshaping global trade relationships. Observers see this as an attempt to appeal to both American businesses and voters who favor tougher but strategic trade policies.

Economists caution that the real impact of the deal will depend on its final terms and implementation. While announcements generate optimism, translating them into legally binding agreements can be complex and time-consuming. Issues such as tariff reductions, regulatory alignment, and dispute resolution mechanisms will require careful negotiation. Until details are finalized, the deal remains a framework rather than a completed pact.

For India, closer trade ties with the United States could support its ambition to become a global manufacturing and export hub. Increased investment and technology transfer may help boost employment and industrial growth. For the US, India represents a fast-expanding market and a strategic alternative in global supply chains. As discussions move forward, both sides are expected to engage in detailed negotiations to turn the announcement into a concrete agreement. The proposed trade deal has raised expectations on both continents, with businesses and policymakers watching closely to see whether it delivers tangible benefits and marks a new chapter in India-US economic relations.

AMIT SHAH LAUNCHES COOPERATIVE CAB PLATFORM BHARAT TAXI



Union Home Minister Amit Shah has officially launched a new cooperative-based cab platform named Bharat Taxi, marking a significant step toward strengthening India's cooperative economy and empowering drivers across the country. The initiative aims to provide a homegrown alternative to existing ride-hailing services while ensuring better earnings, transparency, and ownership for drivers operating within the cooperative framework. Speaking at the launch event, Amit Shah said Bharat Taxi reflects the government's vision of promoting cooperatives as a key pillar of economic growth. He described the platform as a people-centric model that places drivers at the heart of the system rather than treating them as contractual workers. According to him, the cooperative structure will allow drivers to become stakeholders, giving them a sense of security, dignity, and long-term financial stability. Bharat Taxi has been designed to operate on a commission-light model, reducing the financial burden on drivers that is commonly associated with

aggregator platforms. Officials involved in the project said the platform will function through registered cooperatives at the state and district levels, enabling local participation and decentralized management. This structure is expected to improve accountability while keeping profits within the driver community. The platform will initially roll out in major cities and tourist hubs, with plans for gradual expansion to tier-two and tier-three cities. Bharat Taxi will offer standard services such as city rides, outstation travel, and airport transfers, while also focusing on safety, transparent pricing, and customer trust. Authorities said the app interface has been developed with simplicity in mind to ensure ease of use for both drivers and passengers. Amit Shah emphasized that Bharat Taxi aligns with the government's broader push for self-reliance and digital empowerment. He said India needs technology platforms that serve national interests and support grassroots workers. By combining digital innovation with the cooperative movement, Bharat Taxi aims to create a sustainable

and inclusive mobility ecosystem. Drivers' associations welcomed the launch, calling it a long-awaited move that could address long-standing concerns about high commissions, unpredictable earnings, and lack of social security. Many drivers expressed hope that the cooperative model would give them greater control over their work conditions and income while reducing dependence on private aggregators. Industry observers see Bharat Taxi as part of a growing trend toward cooperative and public-interest digital platforms in India. They note that the success of the initiative will depend on efficient execution, competitive pricing, service quality, and strong technological support. Building customer confidence and ensuring consistent availability of vehicles will be crucial in competing with established players in the market. The launch also carries political and social significance, highlighting the government's emphasis on cooperative institutions as tools for economic empowerment. Amit Shah reiterated that cooperatives are not just economic entities but instruments of social change that can uplift workers and promote equitable growth. As Bharat Taxi begins operations, expectations are high among drivers and policymakers alike. If implemented effectively, the platform could reshape the ride-hailing landscape in India by demonstrating that technology-driven services can thrive under cooperative ownership. The initiative is being closely watched as a test case for blending digital innovation with cooperative principles in the country's rapidly evolving transport sector.

KARAN JOHAR SAYS WORKING WITH “TERRIFYING” SAROJ KHAN ON DDLJ “TRAUMATISED” HIM



Filmmaker Karan Johar has opened up about a challenging experience early in his career, recalling how legendary choreographer Saroj Khan reacted to his involvement during the making of *Dilwale Dulhania Le Jayenge* (DDLJ). In a conversation with *The Hollywood Reporter India*, Johar described the encounter as frightening and emotionally taxing, even though he ultimately acknowledged Saroj Khan's talent.

Johar began his career in the film industry as a costume assistant on the 1995 romantic drama, working under Aditya Chopra and alongside designer Manish Malhotra. Years later, he reflected on the intensity he experienced on set, particularly during the filming of the song 'Mehndi Laga Ke Rakhna.'

"At that time, the costume dada was my biggest ally... Manish would come in the morning, hand over the clothes, and leave. I was the costume assistant, and Pam aunty was deeply involved in the process," Johar recalled, referring to Pamela Chopra's hands-on role with costumes.

Trouble emerged when Saroj Khan requested additional red scarves for dancers mid-shoot. The team did not have enough fabric on hand, prompting Johar to suggest a workaround to Saroj's assistant: "...it would look stylish if the dancers put one hand in their pocket and held the scarf in the other."

However, when Saroj Khan learned of the idea she was not receptive. Johar said she "lost it," demanding red satin cloth immediately or threatening not to shoot. He later described the ordeal vividly: "She caught hold of me — literally pushed me — and said, 'Go wherever you have to. Go to Goregaon, bring the red cloth, or I will not shoot.' I remember running on the streets of Goregaon with the costume dada, desperately looking for red satin cloth. I was scared for my life. I was traumatised. She was terrifying."

Despite the fear he felt at the time, Johar balanced his account by acknowledging Saroj Khan's skill and contribution to Indian cinema. "She was scary, but she was the best. She didn't like me at all. She was just unhappy with me," he said, underlining the creative intensity she brought to her work.

Johar also shared a lighter memory from the same production involving his tendency to give unsolicited costume suggestions. During the filming of 'Tujhe Dekha Toh Yeh Jaana Sanam,' he playfully dressed the lead actors in dungarees — an idea Saroj Khan reacted to with surprise. "She looked at them and said, 'Yeh baba baby banke kyun aaye hain?'" I answered back... She'd be like, 'Yeh kyun bolta rehta hai?' because I was always giving my two cents," he said with a laugh.

RAJPAL YADAV TO SURRENDER AT TIHAR JAIL AFTER DELHI HC REJECTS EXTENSION IN CHEQUE BOUNCE CASE



The Delhi High Court on Thursday rejected actor Rajpal Yadav's final plea to delay his surrender in a cheque bounce case, directing him to report to jail immediately. The court refused to hear any further requests until he surrendered, noting that he had already failed to comply with earlier orders. Yadav sought more time to clear pending dues to Murli Projects Pvt Ltd, with his counsel assuring a payment of Rs 25 lakh and a tentative repayment plan. However, the bench said enough leniency had been shown and that Yadav had repeatedly failed to honour commitments made to the court. The case relates to a May 2024 conviction under the Negotiable Instruments Act, in which Yadav was sentenced to six months in jail. His

sentence had earlier been suspended on the promise of a settlement, but repeated payment defaults led the court to revoke relief. Following the order, Yadav's counsel confirmed that the actor would surrender at Tihar Jail later on Thursday.
